An Interview with Villa Girl Saima Huq '91!





Education: Master of Public Health, The George Washington University, 2000 BA, American University, 1995 Major: Print Journalism. Minor: International Relations.

Current Job: I am a Contact Tracer for the University of Pennsylvania, and an emergency responder at a retirement community in NE Philadelphia (so I live there with the older folks.) I also run my own two companies, *Always Love Lucy Theatre* and *King Lahiri Productions*.

Honors and Career Highlights: To be honest, I have NO work honors but I have been dismissed from a lot of so-called "real jobs". Does that count? Usually it can be traced back to money, and so they dismiss me like I'm the highest-paid person there. Believe me, they did not save that much money by letting me go. That's life.

But I learned a lot from all of these jobs, and I am friends with my former coworkers. I did bioterrorism surveillance of the water system for New York City. I ran a research study on air pollution and cardiac events for Harvard, and copresented school programs on stroke and healthy eating with Easy AD of the Cold Crush Brothers for Columbia University's Hip Hop Public Health (www.hhph.org). AD is a Hip Hop pioneer from when the culture began in November 1973, and Jay-Z gave them a shout-out in his 2001 song "H.O.V.A.": "We're overcharging for

what they did to the Cold Crush."

I would like everyone to know that Hip Hop is a world culture that has been recognized by the United Nations since 2007. AD was there when they signed the charter. And he is an associate producer on my upcoming feature film "King Lahiri."

Growing Up: I grew up in Ewing (half a mile from VVA, actually). I have a large immigrant/first-generation family from Pakistan, and two of my three sisters also graduated from Villa (Nazish '90 and Sarah '95). We are Muslim, and I always appreciated that VVA was truly inclusive of different religions even back in the 1980s. They did it because it was the right thing to do, there was no internet and definitely no social media to post about it. The nuns could teach these corporate board members a thing or seven about true diversity, equity and inclusion.

Favorite Villa Memory: The plays. I first joined the plays just because everyone else was in it and what was I going to do after school by myself anyway.

The shows were really well-done. I knew that at the time, and I believe that is why I run such great theatre productions in New York (and now in Trenton) because I have no theatre training past VVA musicals. Yet I have been interviewed by Pat Healy of *The New York Times* for my production of Death of a Salesman (one of the cast is now touring as Golde in Broadway's company of Fiddler on the Roof.) I turned an original adaptation of King Lear into a feature film King Lahiri and it is making the film festival circuit now. Danish Farooqui, who plays Danish Lahiri, is about to make his Broadway debut in The Kite Runner. It features Joe Gannascoli (Vito from HBO's Sopranos) as a restaurant owner. I named his character Frabizio Vitelli, after my VVA friend Holly Frabizio.

When I first started producing theatre in New York, I thought I would only meet actors as great as when I was in high school plays. Nope! A lot of people from professional drama conservatories are not on time, don't know their lines or have egos so big I don't know how they fit in the door. And I find that unacceptable. I have fired actors who won't think of their costars and the production instead of just themselves -- and I time how long it takes to replace them. It has never taken me more than 45 minutes.

I got my cowbell from Amazon. I have no idea how Sr. Josephine found a cowbell in the 1980s without the Internet. N o w that's one innovative and resourceful teacher!

My hobbies: Sleep is great! Prepandemic, I was a tour guide at Central Park Zoo for 6 years, so I learned a lot about wildlife and conservation, but also how to talk with the public and work with Boomers, who are all still my friends and don't deserve the stigma younger people give them. I appreciate zoos in a whole new way now, and make sure to thank volunteers at any events I attend, whether at a zoo or not.


